## Membership

As of August 31, 2006, MMTA has 8 Local Associations and 190 members. National dues are \$59 and state dues are \$35, annually. Local associations each set their own dues, which range from \$10 to \$25.

Website

The *Membership* roster and the *Teacher Search* page (along with a few other sections of the web site) are being updated. In early October final updates to the MMTA Pre-college syllabus will appear on the web site.

MMTA's web site, <u>www.msmusicteachers.org</u>, contains the following: links to MTNA, brief MMTA history, officer page, student activities page, certification page, confer-

ence page, teacher search, calendar page, conference page, news page, and a "members only" section. MMTA publishes spring, summer and fall versions of its magazine, the *MMT* (*Mississippi Music Teacher*) on the web site. It includes articles and reports submitted by members and officers, pictures and information about students and teachers, and more. The current issue, along with several previous issues can be found on the MMTA website in a PDF format. There are plans to include new sections to the web site, so keep looking at the site for the latest information!

## Collegiate Competitions

The state collegiate competitions (not MTNA) that have normally been held in the fall at our conference have been moved to the spring. They will be held on March 3, 2007, at Millsaps College. Moving the state collegiate competitions to the spring should eliminate many venue problems, allow more time during the fall conference for professional development workshops and recitals, as well as help teachers and new students with repertoire preparation.

College teachers who are members may enter students in piano, vocal, brass, guitar, strings, and woodwind categories including: Freshman/Sophomore Solo, Junior/Senior Solo, Concerto, and Chamber. Applications for these events are submitted through our web site.

## • Summary of recent MMTA Board Activities

- 1. More donations have been received for our members affected by Hurricane Katrina over the past several months from all across the country. MMTA would like to again express its sincerest appreciation for the generosity of those who contributed music, instruments, and money over the past 12 months.
- 2. MMTA will offer a hotel and conference meal fee waiver to teachers from GCMTA who were severely affected by Hurricane Katrina.
- 3. A proposal has been drafted for updates and revisions to the MMTA Constitution. Both current and proposed versions are available online for members to compare. Pending approval of the proposed revisions: the nominating committee restructured the offices to divide the VP for Precollege Activities into two positions.
- 4. Revisions were approved by the board to update the Pre-college auditions syllabus.

# VICE PRESIDENT FOR PRE-COLLEGE ACTIVITIES

Isn't it exciting to begin a new school year? Beginners are excited with each success. High school students, exhausted in May, are enthusiastic about new pieces. This is the time to think of MMTA Auditions! Why not encourage *every* student to participate in Auditions?

We can educate parents about Auditions being a *non-competitive* event, designed to encourage teachers to prepare students for evaluation in written theory, sight reading, and technical skills, all of which contribute to greater success in performance. Wouldn't it be great if all parents recognized the



benefits, even if their child didn't score 90 or above in all areas? Parents expect schools to test students and rate progress, and know that every child can't be a straight -A student. Likewise, all piano students can't be "90 or above" students.

A friend told me of the time her father, an educator, changed her life, telling her that the adage "Anything worth doing is worth doing well," doesn't mean "doing best," and in fact, he assured her, some things should be done for fun, and mediocre is "ok." It reminded me of the year I played basketball at Cleveland High under Coach Margaret Wade. To say I played is a bit of a stretch: I practiced with the team. I had a "half suit" which meant that Sharon and I shared a basketball uniform. Maybe Coach Wade saw that I "needed" my classmates to know me as more than a serious student and pianist when I tried out. Sharon and I never played, but we practiced every day, and alternate games we got to wear the uniform and sit on the bench. I worked hard, had fun and most importantly, learned that I didn't have to be "outstanding" to enjoy and benefit from an activity.

Then there is SSRR! Because they are linked, we sometimes forget that Auditions and SSRR serve two different purposes. State Special Recognition Recitals are designed to recognize outstanding students in recitals which serve as "state finals" for the more competitive -minded. In order to present many students in a recital format, we do not ask judges to provide written critiques. This format has served us well for many years as was reaffirmed by the Pre -college Committee this summer. Some teachers have expressed disappointment that we don't have almost 100% participation by qualifying students. As a teacher, I have sometimes wished that more of my students would play at SSRR, but I have to acknowledge that even as I believe it would be a great motivating experience for the student, there is a bit of selfishness on my part. As a mother of four, I also believe that some of the family activities that keep students away may be more important to the student than SSRR at that particular time in their life.

MMTA Conference is just around the corner. Plan to hear the piano and strings students in the Pre-college Concerto competition. With MMTA competitions moved to a new date, President - Elect Angie Willoughby has scheduled more pedagogical sessions than we have had in recent years. Please let your families know that your attendance is important to your professional growth and come! I am confident you will be pleased, and want to come next year.

As I complete my term of office, I want to express my appreciation to all who helped me in so many ways. Special thanks to Carolina Whitfield-Smith for her many hours of work and all she taught me as we worked together. jsthornell@bellsouth.net







# **Conference** Personalities



## **Bell Concert Series/MMTA Recital Artists** Norman Fischer, cello and Jeanne Kierman, piano

Celebrating their 26th anniversary during this season, the **FISCHER DUO** continues to explore the rich repertoire for cello and piano. The Washington Post has described the **FISCHER DUO** 's all-French programming as "intense and totally committed, with a solid understanding of the subtleties of the French style"; the New York Times has commented on "a real sense of dialogue in this duo's ensemble" as well as "a salon-like intimacy and warmth"; and the Boston Globe has heralded Norman Fischer's "boldly imaginative and technically assured skills" and Jeanne Kierman as "equally impressive." In addition to featuring works by the masters, the **FISCHER DUO** has become known for their thematic approach to programing, have performed neglected pieces by composers such as Franz Liszt, Victor Herbert, Nadia Boulanger and Feruccio Busoni, and have commissioned new works by American composers George Rochberg, <u>Augusta Read Thomas</u>, Robert Sirota, David Stock, Samuel Jones, and Richard Lavenda among others. Their CD of French masters on the Northeastern label (NR 238-CD) has received rave reviews. The members of Fischer Duo were selected as an Artistic Ambassadors for the United States Information Agency and toured South America in the Fall of 1996; in October of 1997, the Fischer Duo has been asked to tour in South Africa.

**Lynn Rice-See, IMTF Luncheon** Since her 1982 Carnegie Recital Hall debut, Lynn Rice-See has appeared as recitalist, concerto soloist, and chamber musician in the United States and in Europe. She has appeared three times with the Janácek Philharmonic Orchestra in Ostrava, Czech Republic. In the United States she has appeared as soloist with the Gulf Coast Symphony, the Huntsville Symphony, the Johnson City Symphony, and the Kingsport Symphony. In 1992, she appeared in recital in Brussels, sponsored by the Ministere de la Communauté Français, and her 1993 recital tour of Germany was sponsored by the German-American Institute in Saarbrücken. She was a member of the Tennessee Arts Commission touring ros ter from 1991 through 1994.

Rice-See holds the Bachelor of Music degree from Peabody Conservatory, where she studied with Walter Hautzig, the Master of Music from The Juilliard School where she studied with Beveridge Webster, and the Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of Southern California, where she studied with John Perry. She is also a member of the faculties of the



School in Vermont and the Piano Wellness Seminar. Prior to coming to MTSU, Rice-See worked as an opera coach/assistant conductor at the opera houses of Münster and Essen, Germany as well as at Michigan Opera and Dayton Opera in the United States. She has also taught at the Manhattan School of Music in New York, East Tennessee State University, and William Carey College.

In celebration of the Tennessee bicentennial she and mezzosoprano Sharon Mabry issued a compact disk on the Heartdance label of works by Tennessee composers. This disk contains world premiere recordings of works for solo piano and mezzo-soprano and piano by Kenton Coe of Johnson City, Michael Alec Rose of Nashville, Jeffrey Wood of Clarksville, and Michael Linton of Murfreesboro.

## **Conference Recital Artist**

**Tenor John Wesley Wright** is known for his artistic and soulful interpretations of music from classical to Broadway. He has performed in opera houses, concert halls, and festivals throughout the United States, Europe, and Japan.

With a host of opera and oratorio roles, art songs, spirituals, and cabaret music in his repertoire, Wright's 2004-2005 season includes performances of the Evangelist in Bach's *St. John Passion* with the Dayton Bach Society; holiday concerts with the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra; Handel's *Messiah* with the Ensemble Corund of Switzerland; and concert and festival appearances in Cape Cod (Eventide Arts Festival), Chicago, Dallas, and Savannah.

Other special engagements include the title role in Britten's *St. Nicholas* at the Metropolitan Choral Festival of Detroit and the

Cincinnati premiere of Donald McCullough's spiritual cantata *Let My People Go*, performed with the Vocal Arts Ensemble of Cincinnati in conjunction with the opening of the National Underground Railroad Museum. Mr. Wright also joins forces with Cincinnati's premier early music ensemble, the Catacoustic Consort and makes his New York debut this season with the acclaimed Gay Gotham Chorus, followed by his Town Hall debut at the Gay Valentine Music Celebration.

On recording, Wright's live concert CD entitled *Wade in the Water: Songs of the River, the Lakes, and the Sea* was released in March 2004 and has sold several hundred copies. John received critical acclaim in Europe for his work on the compact disc *Christmas Time is Here*, made with the award-winning Belgian children's choir Scala. The success of the recording led to many concert tours of Belgium and an invitation to sing a nationally televised Christmas Eve concert in 2000 at the Royal Palace for the Belgian Royal Family.

Gold medalist and top prize winner of the Savannah Music Festival American Traditions Vocal Competition 2000, Wright has also claimed top prizes from the National Federation of Music Clubs, Metropolitan Opera National Council, Bel Canto Regional Artists, Ohio's Vocal Resource Network Art Song Competition, and the International Schubert Competition in Vienna, Austria.

John Wright is a native of Rome, Georgia, and holds degrees from Maryville College (TN) and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (OH). He is an active vocal consultant, clinician, and leader of workshops on "Singing in the African American Tradition" in schools, churches, and colleges. An artist faculty member at the Berkshire Choral Festival (MA) in the summers, John is in his seventh year as Artist-in-Residence at the University of Dayton (OH) where he teaches private voice and co-directs the Opera Workshop program.





Maurice Hinson is one of America's most respected authorities on piano literature. Among his outstanding achievements, he received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Music Teachers National Association at it Washington, D.C. convention in the spring of 1994, the Outstanding Alumni Award from the University of Florida in 1990, and the Outstanding Alumni Award from the University of Michigan in the fall of 1995. Dr. Hinson has performed, lectured and given master classes worldwide. His books and editions have become classic standards in the studios of serious piano teachers and students the world over. He was awarded the Franz Liszt Medal by the Hungarian Government in 1986. Hailed as a specialist in American piano music, some of his most recent articles appear in the New Grove Dictionary of American Music in the United States. Education: Piano study at Sherwood Music School in Chicago and The Julliard School in New York; B.A. from University of Florida, M. Mus. And D.M.A. from University of Michigan.

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**Nancy Weems**, Professor of Piano at University of Houston's Moore School of Music, received her B.M. from Oberlin Conservatory of Music, an M.M. from University of Texas at Austin and did advanced studies at the University of Houston. She was the winner of the 1983 U.S. Artistic Ambassador Auditions, a winner of the Bach performance for the International Piano Recording Competition in 1979, 1990 Grammy Award nominee, Texas MTA Collegiate teacher of the year in 1991, and University of Houston Enron Teaching Excellence Award 1994-95. She has performed in numerous solo recitals and orchestral appearances throughout the US and twelve foreign countries. She made her solo debut in

1988 at the Kennedy Center in Washington and has been a featured artist at many state MTNA conventions and appeared at the MTNA national convention in 1991. She was a lecturer at the World Piano Pedagogy Conference in 1999. Current and former students have won prizes at state, national, and international competitions and several are under professional artist management. 

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# For forty years, **Weekley and Arganbright** have made concert tours of the USA for Community Concerts (a division of Columbia Artists Management, New York), Allied Concerts (Minneapolis), and various other managers. They perform entirely from memory. Concert tours abroad have included the major cities of England, Ireland, Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Russia, Korea, China, and Taiwan. Their orchestral engagements have included the Minnesota Orchestra, the Dublin Symphony, the Orlando Symphony, and various orchestras in the Chicago, Detroit, and Washington areas. They have given concerts in Carnegie Recital Hall in New York, and in the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, among other great halls. The Weekleys,

sic, taught for 28 years at the University of Wisconsin at LaCrosse, and were given the permanent title "Treasures of the University" upon their departure from that institution. As a part of their interest in the music education of young people, they made several appearances on the "Captain Kangaroo" television program, and continue to present workshops and master classes in the art of duet playing throughout the world. They have held an international "Four-Hand Fest" for duet enthusiasts every summer since 1980.

Dallas Weekley and Nancy Arganbright are largely responsible for the revival of interest in onepiano, four-hand performance, an art which began in the eighteenth century and flourished in the Romantic era, the nineteenth century. Largely ignored as a concert medium in the early twentieth century, it was revived in great part by Weekley and Arganbright (husband and wife), who made concert tours throughout the USA and the world from 1960 to 2000. They have presented more piano duet concerts than any other fourhand artists in the history of the medium, and are credited with being "America's premier onepiano. four-hand team." - Clavier







John Paul, Harpsichord Session: Organist and classical musician John Paul, of Jackson, Mississippi, was the recipient of the 2002 Governor's Excellence in the Arts Award in the category of Artist's Achievement.\* John Paul grew up in Lyme Regis, Dorsetshire, England. In 1961, he won entrance to the Royal Academy of Music in London where his principle teachers were Alan Richardson, C.H. Trevor, Eric H. Thiman and Thurston Dart. He holds the Academy's diplomas in Piano and Organ, an honours degree

Dart. He holds the Academy's diplomas in Piano and Organ, an honours degree from the University of London and a Doctorate from the University of Colorado. In 1965, he immigrated to Jackson, Mississippi, to become Organist and Choirmaster at St. Andrew's Episcopal Cathedral, also serving as Organist at Temple Beth Israel since 1973. At St. Andrews, he has been responsible for all service music and the Wednesday at St. Andrew's noontime concert series begun in 1971, which guickly became a model for such concert series throughout the coun-Paul has a special interest in the plucked keyboard instruments and has trv. toured as a Harpsichordist since 1980 presenting concerts, workshops and informances in the United States, South American and Europe. Since 1997, he has been in partnership with Harpsichordist Shawn Leopard in many performances from Boston to Miami. This duo has recorded the Bach Trio Sonatas with Lyrichord Discs and the Soler Concertos for Two Keyboards with the Centaur label. Centaur released Paul's recording of the complete clavichord pieces of Herbert Howells in January of this year. \* This text was taken from the Senate resolution for the 2002 Excellence in Arts Award.



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FORTEPIANO SESSION: Rachel Heard, an active performer, teacher and adjudicator in the US, combines her skill on the fortepiano and modern piano to present recitals, lectures and period performance practice demonstrations. Her DMA is from Rutgers University where she specialized in 18th century fortepiano. Her Master and Bachelor of Music degrees are from The Julliard School. Fortepiano studies were with Malcolm Bilson. She has been an active performer on fortepiano for over fifteen years and gave a recital during the 1991 Mozart Bicentennial in Calgary, Canada. Lectures on fortepiano and performance practice were presented at The Julliard School, Concordia College, South Jersey Music Teachers' Association, and Shore Music Educators Association. She has recently performed solo fortepiano recitals for the Mississippi Academy of Ancient Music. Her performances have aired on MPB and her latest recording has been released on NAXOS featuring fortepiano music of Franz Joseph Haydn. She has served two terms as president of the New Jersey Music Teachers' Association and has been nominated as President-Elect for MMTA for

2007-8. She has been on the faculty of Westminster Conservatory and Emory and Henry College. Rachel is assistant professor of music at Millsaps and is serving as local 2006 MMTA Conference coordinator.

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## Biljac Burside: Piano Cla\$\$—Financial Concerns for the Independent Teacher


